



Global Patrol Boat Market and the African Maritime Security Challenges

The global impact of piracy on the world is growing as the economic and social struggle turns to extreme measures to feed their families and make a stand against the vast wealth that is being gained from the oil and other resources in these seas. Also the impact of Illegal, Unreported and Unregulated fishing (IUU) is uncontrolled leading to fears that this will largely affect the African economy and populations on the coast line that are dependent on the fish food. The current economic situation in Africa restricts individual states from being able to effectively tackle the problem. Unclear definitions over territorial laws and a lack of better coordination between African nations has enabled piracy to escalate with ambiguities and ways to avoid conviction or capture.

Maritime security operations entail routine patrols to determine patterns of life in the maritime domain, enhance mariner-to-mariner relations and disrupt the transport of illicit cargo. Through persistent maritime security operations, costal nations show its commitment to enabling the free flow of commerce for legitimate traffic as well as to contest the battle space in all areas where the transport of illicit cargo is used to fund and/or arm terrorism and other unlawful activities is paramount.

The piracy problem in East and West Africa received global attention in 2007 and stimulated interest in African maritime security challenges. Following a dramatic increase in the number of hijackings, international and regional actors established a large and focused framework for cooperation.

The African states are already working to come to grips with the maritime security challenges. Together, they have developed maritime strategies that serve as platforms for the employment of military, political, and economic measures. More can be done to minimize the risks against international and African maritime interests.

Global Patrol Boat Market

A patrol boat is a relatively small naval vessel generally designed for coastal defence, border protection, immigration law-enforcement, search, and rescue duties. There have been many designs for patrol boats. They may be operated by a nation's navy, coast guard, police force or customs. They

are commonly found engaged in various border protection roles, including anti-smuggling, anti-piracy, fisheries patrols, and immigration law enforcement. They are also often called upon to participate in rescue operations.

They may be broadly classified as inshore patrol vessels (IPVs) and offshore patrol vessels (OPVs). They are warships typically smaller in size than a corvette and can include fast attack craft, torpedo boats and missile boats, although some are as large as a frigate.

The offshore patrol vessels are usually the smallest ship in a navy's fleet that is large and seaworthy enough to patrol offshore in the open ocean. Smaller inshore patrol vessels also known as coastal patrol craft or coastal patrol boats. Riverine patrol craft are used for patrolling river areas. In larger militaries, such as in the United States military, offshore patrol vessels usually serve in the coast guard, but many smaller nations' navies operate these types of ships.

Global patrol boat market is primarily driven by high adoption of various types of patrol boats across the globe. A patrol boat is referred to as patrol ship, patrol craft, or patrol vessel is a relatively small naval vessel. This boat is generally designed for coastal defense duties and the patrol boat may be operated by the police force, coast guard, nation's navy. In addition, the various types of patrol boat such as large patrol boats, medium patrol boats, and small patrol boats intended for river or marine environments. The patrol boats engaged in several border protection roles such as fisheries patrols, anti-smuggling, immigration law enforcement, and anti-piracy.

The challenges for the design of reliable patrol boats consist in developing an optimized hull form and integrating state of the art vessel components such as propulsion, power units, and mission equipment in order to offer a highly efficient and flexible platform, improving operability at sea. Patrol vessel designs are answering the operational requirements of surveillance and protection missions.

Patrol Boat Operational General Requirements

Large endurance with fuel efficiency, good seakeeping performances by high speed and high sea states, flexibility of the lay-out allowing integrating fast ribs and, autonomous marine vehicles efficient integration of weapon. communication and surveillance systems are the key features of various designs. International shipbuilders can provide many different solutions with tailor-made characteristics for you to protect strategic places. Considering that clinet's main asset is the crew, ahouls designers pay special attention to the crew comfort and safety by delivering ergonomic lay-out design and highquality accommodation and mission facilities.

- The patrol boat can be operated and controlled from a flying bridge with large windows, offering a wide-angle view of the horizon on all sides.
- A small caliber cannon can be fitted on the fore deck can be fired against speed boats, helicopters and small aircrafts and UAVs. The patrol boat should be armed with 12.7mm machine guns for defence against lightly armoured targets.
- The onboard HF and VHF radio equipment provides communication over short and long distances, while a stabilized video camera with a laser spotlight is used to detect and identify possible or confirmed targets.
- The boat should be equipped with high-definition marine radar, antenna mast, and searchlights atop the surveillance bridge. Patrol boats can sail at high speeds and operate over a distance of 1,500nm, when sailing at a speed of 15kt. The hull should be designed to offer high sea-keeping performance.
- The boat should have the ability to endure seven days without refueling. It should incorporate two electric generators systems and can be offered with two fixed-pitch propellers or waterjets.

International Shipbuilders R&D teams are continuously improving its patrol vessels – making them faster, quieter, more economical and more environmentally friendly. Designed for ultra-high-speed patrol duties in all water's interceptors, patrol boats can outpace most other vessels. From maximizing operations and lowering risk to reducing operational costs. It's clear and obvious that patrol vessel operations can benefit greatly from autonomous vessel technology as well.

Patrol Boats deliveries in African Nay

- As Mozambique tries to quell illegal fishing, drug trafficking and other maritime security threats in its waters, in February 2023, the U.S. has provided a 10-meter coastal patrol boat to its Navy. Mozambican Navy officials also participated in training offered by the boat's U.S. manufacturer, SAFE Boat International. The \$700,000 high-speed boat is used for interdictions and maritime boarding operations. As of 2021, Mozambique's Navy had 14 patrol and fast patrol boats.
- In January 2023, the United States government delivered two high-speed patrol boats to the Tanzanian Navy to boost its capacity to fight sea crimes such as illegal fishing and drug trafficking. Valued at more than \$1.35 million, the boats are a 10.5-meter Interceptor model and an 11.5meter enclosed cabin command boat.
- In Jine 2023, the Ghana Navy has received two high-speed Protector class ships from the United States of America to boost its maritime law enforcement mandate. The vessel has a maximum speed of 25 knots and has a length of 27 meters, a breadth of 5.9 meters, and a draught of 1.7 meters.
- Ghana Navy has taken delivery of a 20-feet multipurpose Catamaran boat from McHammah Company Limited, a local Engineering Company to aid in search and rescue missions and enhance operational capabilities within the Navy. The ceremony took place at the Naval Headquarters, Burma Camp on 15 November 2023.
- Aresa Internacional has supplied four Aresa 1700 inshore patrol boats to the Nigerian Navy. The Aresa 1700 (Fighter II class) patrol boat is made of aluminium and is 17 meters in length (total length is 19.2 meters) with a beam of 4 meters. Each vessel has a displacement of 7.6 tons. The type is propelled by two MTU engines each producing 1 250 horsepower and operating

a propeller. The top speed is much over 40 knots. A RHIB can be carried at the back of the ship and launched using Aresa's vertical launching system. Nigerian ships are outfitted with thermal and night vision cameras.

- Nigeria's 2023 budget allocates 19 million for the ongoing procurement of three 32 metre Ocea fast patrol boats, six special forces boats, and six RHIBs (rigid hull inflatable boats).
- DEARSAN Begins Construction of 76-meter Offshore Patrol Vessels for the Nigerian Navy. DEARSAN Shipyard officially started the construction of two OPV-76 Offshore Patrol Vessels for the Nigerian Navy with a keel laying ceremony held on September 16, 2022. The contract for the ships with a length of 76.9m and a displacement of 1,100 tons was signed in Nigeria on November 3, 2021.
- of three Multi Mission Inshore Patrol Vessels (MMIPVs) in Durban harbour on Friday, 27 October. During the ceremony, the vessel was officially named SAS King Shaka Zulu. The 62-metre by 11-metre vessels have been designed by Damen to deliver a rapid response capability that is both effective and cost efficient. The vessel is the first Damen Sea Axe vessel to operate in South Africa where, along with its sister ships, its primary role will be to counter piracy, illegal fishing and smuggling operations. The third MMIPV is planned to be delivered within 2024.
- In December 2022, the United States Africa Command, working with the U.S. Embassy in Benin, is delivered a new patrol vessel, associated maintenance and launch facilities, and specialized training to the Beninese Special River and Maritime Police Unit, which is responsible for maritime policing in Beninese waters in the Gulf of Guinea. It is an ongoing effort that has provided support for the past few years to develop the country's capabilities.
- on 20 April 2023, Kenya received six patrol vessels valued at Sh306 million from the Japanese government to enhance security at sea. Speaking during the official handing over of the vessels in Mombasa, Deputy President Rigathi Gachagua said the vessels will be used to deal with illegal, unreported and unregulated fishing and surveillance within Kenya's territorial waters. He said that the patrol boats will

- facilitate physical surveillance and electronic monitoring of marine fisheries to rid the waters of illegal fishing and related crimes
- On 8 April 2024, Kenya has rededicated the patrol vessel KNS Shupavu after a local overhaul performed by Kenya Shipyards Ltd. at a new facility at Mombasa Shipyard at Mtongwe Naval Base. The refurbishment began in November 2021 and, according to Kenya Shipyards Ltd., involved replacing major components such as engines, generators and other machinery, and upgrading the vessel's electrical systems, navigational equipment and other onboard systems.
- On Friday 09 September 2022, the ceremony of transfer of the flag of the Offshore Patrol Vessel "Contre-Amiral FADIKA" to the Ivorian Navy took place in Concarneau (France). The delivery of this vessel follows the signature by the Ministry of Defence of Côte d'Ivoire of a contract for the acquisition of an offshore patrol vessel type P400 for the Ivorian Navy
- In 2019, the Republic of Togo has accepted from France two semi-rigid Silinger patrol boats initially meant for the Libyan Coast Guard.
- Cameroon and France are strengthening their security cooperation. This is the framework for the new impetus given by Ambassador Thierry Marchand. On 8 May 2024 he has just handed over a new boat donated by the French Embassy to the Cameroonian Navy. According to a statement released by the United States Embassy in Cameroon, on January 21, 2020, the Cameroonian Navy plans to purchase in 2020 two 110-foot (34m) Island-class American patrol boats to greater extend its ability to patrol Cameroon's economic exclusion zone.

MESSRS LEONARDO OF ITALY AFFIRM TIMELY DELIVERY OF M-346 FIGHTER AIRCRAFT

The Vice President of Messrs Leonardo, Mr Claudio Sabatino has assured the Chief of Air Staff (CAS), Air Mashal Hasan Abubakar, of his Company's unwavering commitment to the timely delivery of the M-346 fighter aircraft beginning with the first batch of 6 expected in Nigeria before the end of Year 2024. Mr Sabatino stated this when he paid a visit to Nigerian Air Force (NAF) Headquarters on Wednesday, 17 April 2024. While thanking the CAS for the warm reception accorded him and his entourage, Mr Sabatino also stated that further engagement between the NAF and his Company would be necessary to conclude other aspects of the project such as the commencement of pilots and engineering training. Speaking further, Mr Claudio assured the CAS that when finally completed, the maintenance of the aircraft fleet would not constitute a challenge as there is a binding agreement for Leonardo's maintenance support for the minimum of 25 years. He also noted that the manufacturing of the aircraft fleet has reached an appreciable state and is being carried out with the utmost skill and expertise.

The assurance of long-term maintenance support provided by Leonardo was particularly met with appreciation by the CAS, who recognized the inherent value of such commitment in ensuring the sustained operational readiness of the entire aircraft fleet. Reflecting on the journey thus far, Air Marshal Abubakar also acknowledged the challenges overcome and expressed optimism for the future trajectory of the partnership. Envisioning the operational impact that the M-346 fighter aircraft brings to fore, Air Marshal Abubakar went on to underscore its dual role in bolstering training capabilities and augmenting operational effectiveness in diverse mission scenarios. Moreover, the prospect of Close air support. Air Interdiction, and tactical reconnaissance as well as Advanced Pilot Training capabilities inherent in the M-346 fighter aircraft heralded a new prospect for NAF's operational versatility. The CAS further proposed the establishment of a dedicated Program Management Office, tasked with overseeing all facets of the collaboration. Air Marshal Abubakar also used the opportunity of the visit to reiterate the significance of Messr Leonardo's physical presence in Nigeria as a maintenance hub for their long list of African clienteles, whole also emphasizing the need for close coordination and synergy in achieving shared objectives with regards to the expeditious delivery of the fleet.

The M-346 is a jet aircraft optimized for advanced military pilot training, offering a broad range of training capabilities combined with long-term reliability. At the heart of a complex and integrated training system, the M-346 is already in service with the air forces of Italy, Singapore, Israel, Poland, Qatar and Greece.

Digital capabilities

The M-346 – a twin-engine, tandem-seat aircraft with fully digital flight controls and avionics – is equipped with a fly-by-wire flight control system with quadruple redundancy, a modern human-machine

interface with Head-Up Displays (HUD) and Multi-Function Displays (MFD), Hands On Throttle And Stick (HOTAS) controls and in-flight safety features such as the Pilot Activated Attitude Recovery System (PARS). The M-346 can operate in complete autonomy with the aid of its Auxiliary Power Unit (APU).


Counterinsurgency, counterterrorism, anti-crude oil theft and anti-kidnapping operations in Nigeria received a major boost as President Bola Ahmed Tinubu inducted 2 new T-129 ATAK Helicopters and a King Air 360ER Beechcraft into the Order of Battle (ORBAT) of the Nigerian Air Force (NAF) earlier today, 6 February 2024, at NAF Base, Makurdi. The acquisition and induction of these platforms no doubt stands as a symbol of President Tinubu's enduring commitment to the ideals of patriotism and investment in national security as well as a solemn commitment to safeguarding Nigeria's security. Speaking through the Vice President of Nigeria, Senator Kashim Shettima, President Tinubu expressed confidence that the deployment of the newly acquired platforms would significantly enhance the combat efficiency of the NAF in addressing contemporary security challenges, both domestically and within the West African region.

He then called for discipline in operations and the establishment of a robust maintenance culture to maximize the benefits derived therein. Speaking further, President Tinubu expressed pride in the NAF standing as a dependable regional power and emphasized his administration's dedication to supporting it. President Tinubu also reflected on his earlier commitment to eradicating terrorism, insurgency, kidnapping, and other criminal activities that have plagued the country for years. Although he noted that substantial progress has been achieved in ongoing counterterrorism efforts, there should be no cause for celebration until the security challenges are fully addressed. He then called for a change in mindset, strategy and tactics in addressing the menace.

In his remarks, the Honourable Minister of Defence, Dr Badaru Abubakar, acknowledged the sincerity of purpose of the President towards restoring peace in every part of Nigeria. He then expressed his gratitude to the President for his foresight, resilient leadership, and unwavering support to the Armed Forces of Nigeria, despite the numerous challenges confronting the nation. The Minister also reiterated the need for adherence to maintenance schedules and the implementation of robust safety practices to ensure the sustained serviceability status of the aircraft so as to derive maximum benefit for the nation. He urged NAF personnel to align their individual and collective actions with the vision of the President, emphasizing the pursuit of peace, stability, and rapid development objectives.

The commemorative event with the theme, 'Nigerian Air Force at 60: Leveraging Strategic Partnerships in Aerospace Innovations for Regional Security,' is lined up with series of activities to commence from 14-25 May 2024.

The high point of the celebration includes a 2-day International Conference and Exhibition, to be held alongside the Third Edition of the African Air Forces Forum, from 23-24 May 2024 at the International Conference Centre, Abuja. Here, Chiefs of Air Staff from other countries, prominent figures in the defence, aviation and aerospace industries, as well as other stakeholders are expected to grace the occasion to foster dialogue and cooperation towards advancing aviation capabilities across the continent. The pinnacle of the Anniversary celebrations will then culminate into the Ceremonial Parade and Aerial Display to be held at the NAF Base, Kaduna, on 25 May 2024.



Speaking further, Air Marshal Abubakar assured Nigerians that though the NAF is operationally engaged on all fronts, it would not rest until it brings the war to a favourable end to ensure the peace and stability that Nigerians deserve. He then urged all Nigerians to keep the faith and hope in the advancement and prosperity of the nation.

Morocco to acquire Javelin Missiles

On 19 March 2024, the State Department has made a determination approving a possible Foreign Military Sale to the Government of Morocco of Javelin Missiles and related equipment for an estimated cost of \$260 million. The Defense Security Cooperation Agency delivered the required certification notifying Congress of this possible sale.

The Government of Morocco has requested to buy six hundred twelve (612) Javelin FGM-148F missiles (includes twelve (12) fly-to-buy missiles)

and two hundred (200) Javelin Lightweight Command Launch Units (LWCLUs). Also included are missile simulation rounds; Javelin support equipment; hand and measuring tools; books and publications; power plus distribution equipment; component parts and support equipment; life cycle support and other technical assistance; gunner training; ammunition officer's training; System Integration and Checkout (SICO); maintenance training; Tactical Aviation and Ground Munitions (TAGM); and other related elements of logistics and program support. The total estimated cost is \$260 million.

This proposed sale will support the foreign policy and national security of the United States by helping to improve the security of a Major Non-NATO Ally that continues to be an important force for political stability and economic progress in North Africa.

The proposed sale will improve Morocco's long-term defense capacity to defend its sovereignty and territorial integrity and to meet its national defense requirements. Morocco will have no difficulty absorbing this equipment into its armed forces.

The proposed sale of this equipment and support will not alter the basic military balance in the region.

The prime contractors will be the Javelin Joint Venture between Lockheed Martin in Orlando, FL, and RTX Corporation in Tucson, AZ.

There are no known offset agreements in connection with this potential sale. Implementation of this proposed sale will not require the assignment of U.S. Government or contractor representatives to Morocco.

12 AH-1Z for Nigeria

Bell Textron, Inc., Fort Worth, Texas, is awarded a \$455,000,000 firm-fixed-price, undefinitized contract for the production and delivery of 12 AH-1Z helicopters for the government of Nigeria, as well as provides associated engineering, program management and logistics support, and non-recurring engineering for obsolescence. Work will be performed in Fort Worth, Texas (80%); and Amarillo, Texas (20%), and is expected to be completed in July 2028.

Foreign Military Sales customer funds in the amount of \$82,345,771 will be obligated at the time of award, none of which will expire at the end of the current fiscal year. This contract was not competitively procured pursuant to 10 U.S. Code 3204(a)(4). Naval Air Systems Command Patuxent River, Maryland, is the contracting activity.

The United States Africa Command (AFRICOM) is at the forefront of enhancing military capabilities and fostering cooperation through a series of exercises involving the U.S. military, African nations, and international allies. These strategic engagements address critical security concerns ranging from counterterrorism and maritime security to crisis management, peacekeeping, and humanitarian assistance, demonstrating AFRICOM's commitment to global peace and security.

Justified Accord 2024: A Milestone in Peacekeeping Operations

From February 26 to March 7, AFRICOM, in collaboration with the U.S. Army Southern European Task Force, Africa (SETAF-AF), hosted the largest exercise in East Africa - Justified Accord 2024. Taking place in Kenya, this monumental exercise saw participation from the Republic of Tanzania and 22 other countries. It aimed at enhancing the readiness of the U.S. joint force, equipping regional partners for UN and AU multinational missions, and bolstering interoperability for humanitarian and crisis response.

This year marked a significant contribution from the Tanzanian People's Defense Forces Land Forces Command in the Field Training Exercise (FTX),



providing a unique opportunity for joint training with U.S. and U.K Forces. This collaboration focused on dismounted Infantry tasks, directly supporting Peacekeeping missions. Concurrently, TPDF Staff officers engaged in a Command Post Exercise to advance interoperability with the U.S., U.K, and other African nations, ensuring preparedness for future Peacekeeping missions and conflicts.

Cutlass Express 24: Advancing Maritime Security and Cooperation

Highlighting the importance of maritime security, AFRICOM sponsored Cutlass Express 24, an exercise dedicated to enhancing regional cooperation and maritime domain awareness. Conducted by U.S. Naval Forces Africa (NAVAF) and the U.S. Sixth Fleet, this initiative spanned two weeks across East Africa and the Western Indian Ocean. It united participants from numerous nations and international bodies, including Comoros, Djibouti, Georgia, Tanzania and the United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime (UNODC), among others.

The exercise underscored the readiness and cooperation of the Tanzania People's Defense Forces, particularly in maritime domain awareness, anti-piracy efforts, and countering illicit trafficking. The Tanzanian Navy and Marine Police engaged in rigorous training, focusing on visit, board, search, and seizure (VBSS) and maritime interdiction, among other scenarios. A pivotal achievement was the emphasis on legal prosecution of illicit activities, demonstrating the integrated strength of the Tanzania Marine Police Force and the TPDF Navy in safeguarding maritime domains.

Through initiatives like Justified Accord 2024 and Cutlass Express 24, the United States Africa Command continues to play a vital role in global security and cooperation. These exercises not only

strengthen military capabilities but also foster a spirit of collaboration among nations, crucial for addressing contemporary security challenges and promoting peace.

28-Meter Patrol Craft Kits will improve Egypt's capacity to sustain security operations

On 10 January 2024, the State Department has made a determination approving a possible Foreign Military Sale to the Government of Egypt of 28-Meter Patrol Craft Kits and related equipment for an estimated cost of \$129 million. The Defense Security Cooperation Agency delivered the required certification notifying Congress of this possible sale today.

The Government of Egypt has requested to buy additional non-Major Defense Equipment (MDE) 28-meter patrol craft production kits and technical support. The kits consist of Rigid Hull Inflatable Boats, forward-looking infrared systems, and computer packages; technical and logistics support services; transportation; spare parts, materials, equipment, and components; and other related elements of logistical and program support. The estimated total cost is \$129 million.

This proposed sale will support U.S. foreign policy and national security objectives by helping to improve the security of a Major Non-NATO Ally that continues to be an important force for political stability and economic growth in the Middle East.

The proposed sale will improve Egypt's capacity to sustain security operations and strengthen its internal and external defense capabilities. The proposed sale will assist the Government of Egypt's maritime patrol and interdiction efforts to contribute to regional maritime security efforts in the Mediterranean and Red Sea. Egypt will have no difficulty absorbing this equipment and services into its armed forces.

The proposed sale of this equipment and support will not alter the basic military balance in the region. The principal contractor will be Swiftships, of Morgan City, LA. There are no known offset agreements proposed in connection with this potential sale. Implementation of this proposed sale will require multiple trips to Egypt involving one (1) U.S. Government representative and three (3) contractor representatives for approximately three (3) years for program management, program and technical reviews, training, maintenance support, and site surveys.

"The 28m CPC offers high performance and multimission capabilities while featuring a low lifecycle cost and easy maintenance," added Jeffery LeLeux, President. "It runs on diesel fuel, achieving a top

speed of 25 knots and a range of 900 nautical miles. The maximum range can be increased through side-by-side refueling at sea."

"This proposed sale reinforces our dedication to supporting the Government of Egypt in enhancing its defense capabilities," said Dr. Tim Carter, Group CEO. "We are proud to be a partner to the Egyptian Navy and the nation, contributing to regional maritime security efforts in the Mediterranean and Red Sea."

On 10 October 2019, the State Department has made a determination approving a possible Foreign Military Sale to Tunisia for twelve (12) T-6C Texan trainer aircraft and related equipment and support for an estimated cost of \$234 million. The Defense Security Cooperation Agency delivered the required certification notifying Congress of this possible sale.

The Government of Tunisia has requested a possible sale of twelve (12) T-6C Texan trainer aircraft, spare engines, cartridge actuated devices/propellant actuated devices operational flight trainer, spare parts, ground handling

and support, publications and technical documentation, clothing, textiles and individual equipment, aircraft ferry support, technical and logistical support services, site surveys, minor modifications/class IV support, personnel training and training equipment, U.S. Government and contractor engineering, technical and logistics support services, and other related elements of logistical and program support. The estimated value is \$234 million.

This proposed sale will support the foreign policy and national security of the United States by helping to improve the defense capabilities and capacity of a major non-NATO ally, which is an important force for political stability and economic progress in North Africa. This potential sale will provide additional opportunities for bilateral engagements and further strengthen the bilateral relationship between the United States and Tunisia.

The proposed sale will replace Tunisia's aging trainer fleet and allow Tunisia to continue training pilots to support Tunisia's counterterrorism and border security missions. Tunisia will have no difficulty absorbing this aircraft into its armed forces. The proposed sale of this equipment and support will not alter the basic military balance in the region. The prime contractor will be Textron Aviation Defense LLC of Wichita, Kansas. There are no known offset agreement proposed with this potential sale. However, the purchaser typically requests offsets. Any offset agreement will be defined in negotiations between the purchaser and the contractor.

Algeria Donating Retired MiG-29 Fighters to Sudan

The Algerian Defence Ministry is reportedly set to donate surplus Russian-supplied MiG-29 fighter aircraft to the Sudanese Air Force, which currently operates the class as its primary manned combat jet. Unconfirmed reports of this development follow five years of instability in the East African country after a Western-backed coup in April 2019 that overthrew the administration of popular military leader President Omar Al Bashir. The fracturing of the country's armed forces and deep penetration by European and other foreign interests in the following years culminated in the outbreak of a domestic conflict between the Sudanese Armed Forces and the former Janiaweed militia, with the latter having re-formed into the Rapid Intervention Forces with strong support and funding from the United Arab Emirates. Algeria's support for the Sudanese Armed Forces comes as Khartoum has increasingly turned to Tehran, a close strategic partner of Algiers, for drones and other military equipment, and as the United Arab Emirates has itself played a leading role in funding anti-Algerian political forces in West Africa.



He expressed interest in exploring further collaborations in areas such as training, maintenance and technology transfer. "We are here for partnership", he said.


